KNOW YOUR RIGHTS: SEALING AND EXPUNGEMENT¹



- **Expungement** *erases* arrests and non-convictions from criminal record history.
- **Sealing** *hides* record from the public, including most employers. Government employers and employers that are legally required to run background checks (hospitals, schools, etc.) can see sealed felony convictions.

Step 1: Get Copies of Your Record

Get fingerprinted at the Chicago Police Headquarters (3510 S. Michigan Avenue) and request copies of these two documents:

- Chicago RAP Sheet (Shows offenses from Chicago only); and
- Illinois State Police Statewide Transcript (Shows Illinois offenses from outside Chicago). ²

Qualified Probations (e.g. "710", "1410", "TASC", "Second Chance", or "Offender Initiative" probations).	5 years (Must complete drug test in the 30 days before filing)		
Sealable Offense	<u>Wait Period</u>		
All Felony and Misdemeanor Convictions, Non-Qualified Probations, and Supervisions Not Successfully Completed	3 years (If drug related, must complete drug test in the 30 days before filing)		
EXCEPTIONS: DUI / Reckless Driving over 25 years of age; Domestic Battery; Battery unborn child; Violation Order of Protection/ No Contact/ Stalking Order; Sexual Offenses (except misdemeanor or felony prostitution, misdemeanor public indecency); and crimes against animals	Education Exception: If you obtained vocational or educational certification during the period of your last sentence, you can seal immediately. Subsequent Felonies: If a new conviction occurs after a felony has been sealed, no sealing new offense.		

Step 3: File Your Petition and Prepare for Hearing

• Some courts always schedule a hearing. In Chicago, hearings are only scheduled if law enforcement objects to the petition.
